Martha Harney, M.S., CCC-A - Martha Harney is an Audiology Clinical Supervisor and Lecturer in the Department of Speech and Hearing Sciences at the University of Washington. Her expertise is in Audiological Assessment, Amplification and Aural Rehabilitation. Martha has been employed for 13 years in the University. Her primary work is to mentor audiology graduate students within the University of Washington Speech and Hearing Clinic. She is departmental practicum coordinator, advising AuD students within their clinical rotations and acting as liaison to institutions that provide externship positions. Martha is onsite director of the NW Lions Foundation Hearing Aid Bank at the University of Washington. Martha was employed previously for a decade with Group Health Cooperative providing adult and pediatric diagnostic and amplification services.

Martha's volunteer work has included organizing local fund raisers for international concerns. Martha also previously worked as a Peace Corps volunteer in Africa to provide audiology services to deaf and hard of hearing children, serving within the Kenya Society for Deaf Children. Martha holds her B.A. from San Jose State University and her M.S. in Audiology from the University of Washington. She is a member of the American Speech, Language and Hearing Association, American Academy of Audiology and the Washington Society of Audiology.

Verna Kilic, MS, SLP – Verna Kilic is a speech-language pathologist, who is currently a stay-at-home mother of three children. She obtained her MS in speech-language pathology from the University of Washington, and has worked as a clinical speech pathologist at Group Health and Learning and Language Services. Her special interests are child language acquisition, learning disabilities and second language acquisition, cultural learning, and health education. In addition to English, she speaks Turkish, her husband's language of origin. Verna is currently a board member of Listen and Talk, a private, non-profit program for hearing impaired and deaf infants and children in Seattle, Washington.

Fred D. Minifie, Ph.D: Fred Minifie, Ph.D. is Professor Emeritus of Speech and Hearing Sciences, at the University of Washington where he served for 29 years, including eleven years as Department Chair. He previously taught at the University of Wisconsin for 8 years. He has authored five books about speech and hearing, including the seminal textbook (with Hixon and Williams), "Normal Aspects of Speech, Hearing, and Language", and has published over 60 scientific and professional articles in national and international journals. Fred's prolific research career has been supported by numerous grants from the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, and the US Department of Education.

As President of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association in 1983, Fred directed this enormous organization through one of its most formative periods, and he continues to serve as an advisor to the Association. Fred has served as President of both the American Speech-Language Hearing Foundation and the Council of Graduate Programs in Communication Sciences and Disorders. His contributions have been widely recognized with many honors and awards, including most notably the

Honors of the Association, awarded by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association in 1990, the Honors of the Council of Graduate Programs in Communication Sciences and Disorders, the 2000 Golden Ear Drum Award by the Virginia Merrill Bloedel Hearing Research Center, and as the Outstanding Graduate from the University of Iowa, Department of Speech Pathology and Audiology.

Since his retirement in 2000, Fred has produced a number of instructional animations on the physiology of speech and hearing mechanisms. He is also a past President of the Northwest Lions Foundation for Sight and Hearing, and past President and current member of the University Lions Club in Seattle. During 2008-2009, Fred is chairing a fundraising campaign for the Lions Clubs of Washington, Northern Idaho and British Columbia to help families in Bolivia earn enough money to keep their children from having to work in the mines.

Richard Pepe – Rich Pepe is the founder and CEO of Pepe International, a consortium of restaurant, wine, travel, and hospitality businesses based in Carmel, California. Rich is a self-made entrepreneur, executive chef, and restaurateur who owns several properties including Peppoli restaurant at Pebble Beach, Little Napoli "Bistro Italiano", Carmel Bakery, and Pepe Winery, among others. Nancy Hatfield, PhD - Nancy Hatfield is the Director, Early Childhood for Washington Sensory Disabilities Services (WSDS). She was the creative catalyst for effective Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) programs in Washington State and has worked with WSDS since 1992 to enhance statewide capacity to meet the needs of children and young adults with sensory disabilities. She co-directs the deaf-blind project, as well as functioning as administrative director of WSDS staff and grants based at the Puget Sound Educational Service District. 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Auditory Verbal Education/ Therapy

Maura Berndsen, MA, CED, LSLS Cert. AVT - Maura Berndsen is the Educational Director of Listen and Talk, an auditory-verbal therapy and education program in Seattle, Washington that provides early intervention, blended preschool/pre-K classes, auditory-verbal therapy and consultation services for children with hearing loss and their families.
